

PEOPLE Program 25th Year Anniversary







First cohort enrolled - The first group of 24 PEOPLE college scholars enrolled at UW-Madison after completing the precollege program.

2004

Indigenous and elementary school programs launched - The program expanded its recruitment to Indigenous students from northern Wisconsin and elementary school students from low-income communities in Madison.

2010

External evaluation and restructuring - The program underwent its first external evaluation, which led to phasing out services in some areas and reinstituting middle school programming in others.

2023

PEOPLE founded - The program was established by six UW-Madison leaders as a result of Plan 2008, a 10-year plan to increase the diversity and success of four ethnic groups on campus. The program started with 66 tenth grade students from

Milwaukee.

ITA students accepted - The PEOPLE College Scholar program began accepting students from the Information Technology Academy (ITA), a separate precollege program that focuses on technology skills.


PEOPLE moved to DDEEA - The program moved under the administration of the Division of Diversity, Equity, and Educational Achievement (DDEEA), which oversees several other diversity initiatives on campus.



PEOPLE serves over 1,000 students - The program has grown to serve over 1,000 students from eighth grade to college graduation, providing academic support, mentoring, and scholarships.

AP Classes & Exams Can Help Your Student:


- 1. Stand out in college admissions—taking AP is a sign students are ready for college
- 2. Earn college credits—colleges nationwide offer credit, advanced placement or both for qualifying exam scores, which can save time and money
- 3. Skip introductory classes—students can move directly to upper-level and major-specific courses
- 4. Build college skills and confidence—from problem-solving to time management and more
- 5. Pursue interests—students can dig deeper into subjects they want to learn about

By participating in Advanced Placement courses, students are able to experience the rigors of college-level studies while they still have the support of a high school environment. Resourceful and dedicated AP teachers help their students develop and apply the skills, abilities, and content knowledge they will need later in college. By participating in AP courses, along with receiving a passing score on the AP exam, your child has the opportunity to earn college credit and to stand out in the college admission process.

AP RECOGNITION FOR THE SCHOOLS


The College Board Honors Student Achievement on AP Exams:

- AP Capstone: Students with scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on 4 additional AP Exams of their choosing
- AP International Diploma: Students must score a 3 or higher on 5 or more AP Exams
- AP Scholar: Students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.
- **AP Scholar with Honor:** Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.
- **AP Scholar with Distinction:** Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

PEOPLE Scholarship Eligibility

Students who successfully complete the precollege component of PEOPLE or Information Technology Academy (ITA) and have been directly admitted or admitted as transfer to UW-Madison are eligible for a four-year in-state tuition scholarship. To be eligible for the PEOPLE Scholarship students must:

- Successfully complete PEOPLE's precollege program or ITA.
- Receive approval for in-state tuition by the University of Wisconsin-Madison Registrar's Office. See procedure for WI Residency requirements below.*

- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and submit to the University of Wisconsin-Madison Office of Student Financial Aid

- Abide by all academic and non-academic requirements of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and PEOPLE Scholarship Agreement



PEOPLE Scholarship Timeline

Students admitted to UW-Madison under a DDEEA Scholarship Program may be eligible for a four-year tuition scholarship. If the student is found eligible for the scholarship:

They must matriculate to the university within five years of their high school graduation date. Students who do not enroll within five years of high school graduation will not be eligible for a DDEEA scholarship and should contact the Office of Student Financial Aid to discuss additional options for financial support.

The four-years (8 semesters) of funding must be used within 10 years of their first matriculation year to the university and may not support UW-Madison online degree programs of study. Students may petition for a fifth year of funding, but this does not extend the 10-year period of funding availability. The expiration date is May 31st of the 10th year after the college matriculation date.

During the 10-year period a student who stops enrollment and/or re-enters UW-Madison must complete their program's stop and re-entry plan to remain eligible for the scholarship and must fulfill program requirements annually to maintain eligibility during the remaining funding period.

DDEEA scholars who are no longer eligible for the DDEEA scholarship should contact the Division of Continuing Studies for returning adult student services and support.

Segregated Fees: Segregated fees are charges, in addition to tuition, assessed to all students for student services, activities, programs, and facilities that support the mission of University of Wisconsin System institutions, including UW-Madison.


